

BEFORE YOUR ARRIVAL AT LAWRENCE TECH

This checklist outlines each step you must complete before coming to LTU.

- **Complete Your Application.** Check your acceptance letter and other acceptance packet materials to verify that you have submitted all required documents. Some students are admitted to Lawrence Tech on a conditional basis. It is important to complete your application file. If you have not submitted the documents, please do so as soon as possible. Acceptance to Lawrence Tech requires all application materials to be submitted prior to enrollment.
- **Submit Your Enrollment Deposit.** All international applicants are required to submit a US \$500 enrollment deposit to complete their application. Once this is submitted, your place in the incoming class will be confirmed. Please review the important information regarding the enrollment deposit on the Lawrence Tech website: www.ltu.edu/futurestudents/international/international_enrollmentdeposit.asp.
- **Obtain a Passport** from your home country.
- **Obtain Your Certificate of Eligibility, the I-20 (F-1) or DS-2019 (J-1) Form.** This form is issued by Lawrence Tech as proof of your acceptance to the University. It is used to obtain your visa, but it is not the visa itself.
To obtain your certificate of eligibility, you must complete all application requirements and supply the following documents to LTU:
 - **Document of Support.** This is a current bank statement that proves you have sufficient funds to pay for an entire year of school at Lawrence Tech.
 - **Document of Support Verification Form.** Used by Lawrence Tech to verify the information contained in the Document of Support, this form is submitted along with the Document of Support.
 - **Letter of Sponsorship.** If you have a sponsor who is providing you the funding to study at Lawrence Tech, then your sponsor must submit his/her bank statement and a letter stating that he/she is willing to provide you this financial assistance.

If you have not yet received your certificate, please contact the Office of Admissions at admissions@ltu.edu or 1.248.204.3160 to verify what steps you must complete in order to receive it.

- **Pay the I-901 Fee.** This is a fee collected by the U.S. Federal Government for support of SEVIS. It is for administrative costs and must be paid prior to your visa interview. For more information, including current fee schedules, please visit www.fmjfee.com.
- **Attend Your Visa Interview with the U.S. Consulate.** Each international student is required to interview with a U.S. consular officer. Check your local embassy or consulate's website for scheduling options. When obtaining your visa, you must use the I-20 (F-1) or DS-2019 (J-1) form from the school you plan on attending in the United States.
- **Submit Your Lawrence Tech Housing Application and Deposit.** If you wish to live in the University's on-campus housing, you must complete and submit an application, along with a US \$200 deposit, before your arrival at Lawrence Tech. Housing cannot be guaranteed for students who have not completed an application. Applications are available online at www.ltu.edu/housing.
- **Book Your Flight to the United States.** Once you have secured your visa and received your move-in date from the Office of University Housing, book a convenient flight. Detroit Metropolitan Airport (Code: DTW) is approximately 30 minutes by car from Lawrence Tech.
- **Secure Transportation to Lawrence Tech.** Taxi service is available from the airport to Lawrence Tech. Please be sure to have a copy of the address of the University or the hotel where you will be staying until you check into University housing or other living arrangements. Have at least US \$90 to cover the cost of the taxi ride.
- **Register for the New International Student Welcome Week Orientation.** Register online at www.ltu.edu/international.

CERTIFICATE OF ELIGIBILITY

The Certificate of Eligibility (I-20 or DS-2019) is issued upon completion of all admission requirements and with appropriate documentation of support. Please review your certificate to ensure the information is correct and complete. You must have this document in order to apply for your U.S. student visa.



TRAVEL DOCUMENTS

All international students must possess a valid passport and visa in order to enter the United States. Go to the U.S. embassy or consulate in your home country to apply for an F-1 or J-1 visa. With an I-20 form, you'll receive an F-1 visa; with a DS-2019 form, you'll receive a J-1 visa. You must also submit a statement of financial support for your studies. At your port of entry to the United States, immigration officials will inspect your passport, visa, I-901 fee receipt, and financial documentation. The I-94 is now issued electronically and can be found at www.cbp.gov/I94.

Note: You must enter the United States using the I-20 (F-1) or DS-2019 (J-1) form that was used to obtain your visa, and then you must report to that school.

MAINTAINING F-1 OR J-1 STATUS

Full-time enrollment is required by the U.S. Federal Government. You must be a full-time student to maintain your student status. At LTU, full-time study requires 12 credit hours at the undergraduate (bachelor's) level and six credit hours at the graduate (master's and doctoral) level. Failure to maintain your full-time student status will result in the termination of your student visa and may lead to deportation from the United States.

Notice of Address Is Required by the U.S. Federal Government. You must report to Lawrence Tech and provide the University with a current local U.S. address. Additionally, if you change your address while in the United States, you must report it to the University within 10 days. Failure to comply with this regulation is a violation of your student status and will result in the loss of your visa status. Students who violate their visa status may be required to return home.

HEALTH INSURANCE

You are required by law to maintain health insurance coverage for the duration of your studies in the United States. LTU requires the following minimum health insurance benefits for international students and their dependents:

- Medical benefits of at least US \$100,000 per accident or illness
- Repatriation of remains in the amount of US \$25,000
- Expenses associated with the medical evacuation of the exchange visitor to his or her home country in the amount of US \$50,000
- A deductible not to exceed US \$500 per accident or illness

If you are currently covered by medical insurance, obtain a coverage letter, translated into English, from your insurance company prior to your departure to the United States. If your insurance company is located in your home country and does not have a U.S. billing address, you may be responsible for paying all fees accrued and requesting reimbursement from your insurance company. Check with your insurance company for specific payment terms before purchasing a medical insurance policy.

The Office of International Programs recommends that you purchase health insurance from an insurer based in the United States.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENT WELCOME WEEK ORIENTATION

The Office of International Programs provides a comprehensive **week-long orientation program** for all international students **the week before classes begin each semester**. Please plan your arrival to campus accordingly. **Information about the International Student Welcome Week Orientation is available at www.ltu.edu/international.**

The International Student Welcome Week Orientation is

intended to prepare you for the best possible start to your time at Lawrence Tech. It will provide you with information that will help you adjust to American culture, excel academically, and grow personally and professionally.

In this required program for all international students, you will meet with your faculty advisor and register for your first semester's coursework. You also may be required to attend additional sessions depending on your academic program, or whether or not you are a conditional admit needing English language instruction.

Life as an international student means balancing the requirements of U.S. immigration regulations with the academic policies of Lawrence Tech. It is your personal responsibility to learn, understand, and follow all U.S. Federal Government and University regulations. The International Student Welcome Week Orientation provides a foundation for this continual learning process.

CHECK IN

As required by federal law, you must formally check in with the University. Check-in is held on the first day of the International Student Welcome Week Orientation. See the website for its location on campus.

You must have the following documents to check in:

- Copy of the receipt of payment for the I-901 fee
- F-1 or J-1 visa
- I-94 (issued electronically; www.cbp.gov/I94)
- Proof of health insurance
- U.S. address and phone number

LIVING ON CAMPUS

LTU offers excellent and affordable on-campus housing to all students. Currently the University accommodates more than 600 students in three residence halls. All students living in University housing are required to enroll in one of several meal plans.

If you wish to live in University housing, submit your housing application as soon as possible and **before** you

arrive on campus. Housing space fills quickly, and availability is not guaranteed. The Office of University Housing tries to place together students with similar interests and honors specific roommate requests subject to availability.

To reserve your on-campus housing, complete a Housing and Meal Plan Application and Contract and send it with a US \$200 deposit to Lawrence Tech. The Office of University Housing will let you know when you can move into your room.

OFF-CAMPUS HOUSING

If you prefer to live off-campus while attending LTU, you should arrive as early as possible to make the appropriate arrangements. Suitable and convenient off-campus housing is available, but may take time to find and fills quickly as many other students are also searching for economical and convenient rentals. Lawrence Tech cannot make off-campus arrangements for you.

Until your housing arrangements are confirmed, you will need to secure temporary living arrangements. Keep in mind that you may need to stay in a hotel for several weeks, depending on the time of your arrival and the availability of off-campus housing.

TEMPORARY HOUSING

If you are arriving in the United States before the move-in date given you by the Office of University Housing or you need a place to stay while you look for an off-campus apartment, you must arrange for temporary housing. Plan ahead!

If you choose to stay in a hotel, several located within a short distance of the University are listed on the next page. Check with each hotel, mention that you are a Lawrence Tech student to receive a discounted student rate, find out the exact cost per night, and make your reservations in advance.



TRANSPORTATION

After you have arrived at Detroit Metropolitan Airport and cleared immigration and customs, you will need transportation to your hotel or Lawrence Tech, depending on the arrangements you have made. It is highly recommended that you make plans for your ground transportation in advance.

You can make these arrangements by contacting Detroit Metro Airport Car Service at www.metroairportservice.com or by calling 1.800.720.0797. The price is approximately US \$90 for the 30-minute drive to Southfield, where Lawrence Tech is located. This price includes taxes, gratuity, and fees. An additional US \$10 fee will apply if you need a ride between midnight and 5:30 a.m.

Call for your transportation after you have cleared customs and immigration and retrieved your baggage. No phone calls are allowed in the baggage claim area between immigration and customs. There will be a short wait before your transportation arrives. Please be sure to have the address of your destination with you to provide to the driver.

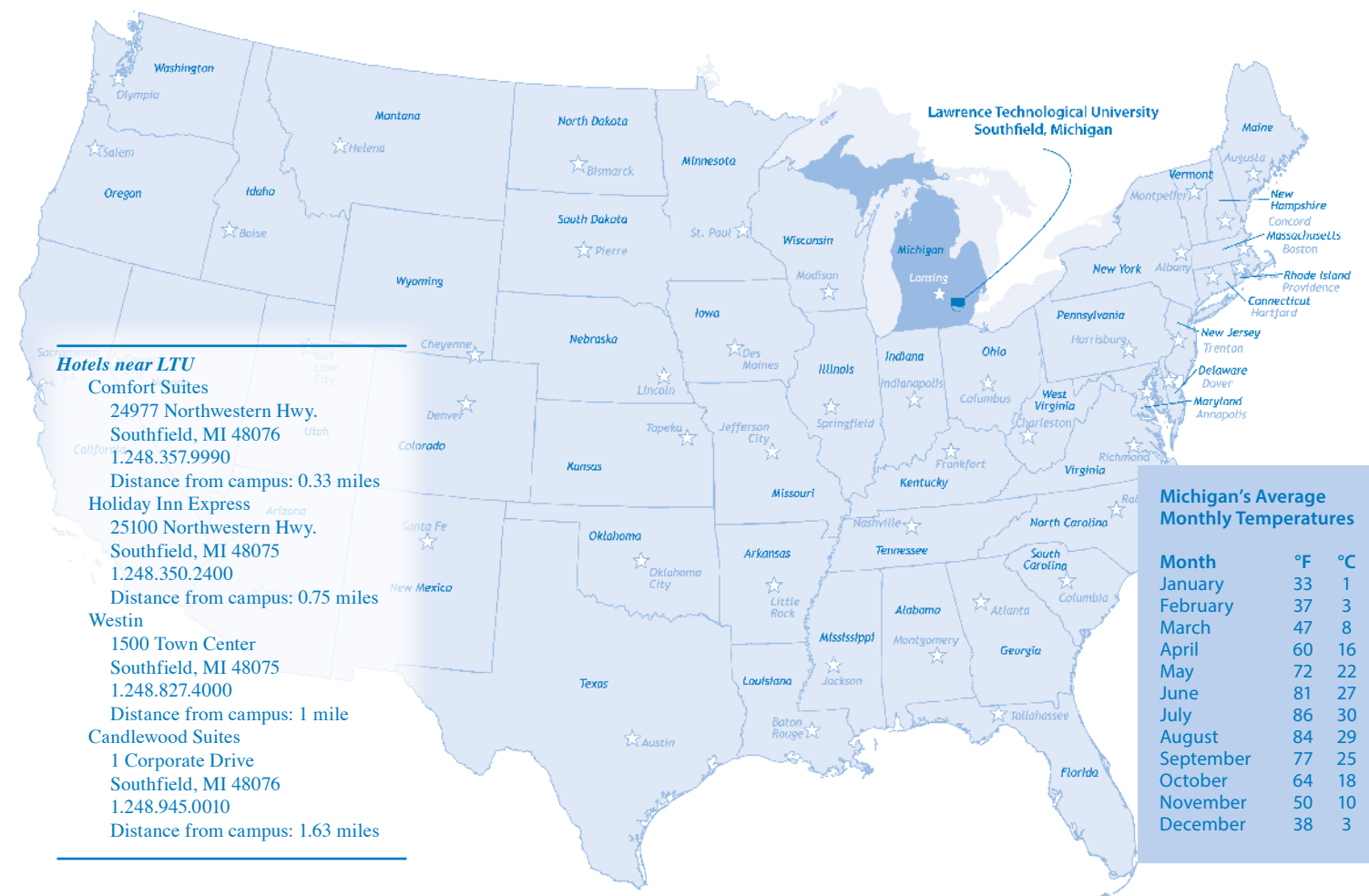
DRIVER'S LICENSE

If you wish to obtain a driver's license upon arriving in Michigan, you can do so but must follow Michigan laws. Please keep in mind that you cannot apply for a driver's license until your SEVIS registration is complete, which takes two to four weeks after classes begin. You will not be able to get a driver's license before the completion of your SEVIS registration. Detailed information about applying for a Michigan driver's license will be provided during International Student Welcome Week Orientation.

If you live on campus, you can use the University's Tech Transit transportation service, which runs regular routes around campus and to the Southfield City Center and area hot spots, including stores, theaters, and banks.

TRAVEL HINTS

When traveling, carry all important documents, checks, and college information with you. Do not leave this information



in your suitcase or other luggage, and do not lose them! These documents are critical to your entry into the United States, as well as your continued stay and should be carried with you at all times. These important documents are:

- I-20 or DS-2019 form
- Passport
- Copy of the receipt of payment for the I-901 fee
- F-1 or J-1 visa
- I-94 (issued electronically; www.cbp.gov/I94)
- Acceptance letter from Lawrence Tech
- Proof of health insurance
- TOEFL or IELTS scores
- Financial information

Money

There is no limit on the amount of money you may bring in or take out of the United States. However, if you transport (by any means, including mail and shipping) more than US \$10,000 into or out of the United States, or if you receive more than US \$10,000, you must report this movement of currency to U.S. Customs and Border Protection. You will be required to complete a Currency Reporting Form (FinCen 105). The penalties for noncompliance can be severe. Visit www.cbp.gov/travel/international-visitors/Kbyg/money for more information on currency reporting.

Note: "Money" means monetary instruments and includes U.S. or foreign coins currently in circulation, currency, travelers' checks in any form, money orders, and negotiable instruments or investment securities in bearer form.

It is best not to travel with large amounts of money. For preliminary expenses, use travelers' checks, which are accepted at most businesses.

Luggage

Attach tags or labels clearly stating your name and home address to every piece of your luggage and hand baggage. Also place a copy of your name and address inside your luggage in the event that a tag is lost during your flight. If your luggage is lost – which hopefully will not happen – immediately file a claim with your airline at its desk in the airport. As a precaution, pack your carry-on baggage with enough clothing and personal items to last you two to three days.

Be sure to check with the airline you are flying about its rules on the size, weight, and number of bags you can check and carry on. Each airline has different guidelines and knowing them ahead of time can save you time and money.



What to Pack

Give priority to the clothes and other items you will need immediately upon your arrival in the United States. It is very easy to purchase clothes and toiletries once you are settled. Lawrence Tech students generally dress informally for most classes. Men and women wear jeans, slacks, or shorts in combination with sport shirts, t-shirts, or sweatshirts. Normal spring and summer shoes include tennis shoes, sandals, and flats, while snow and hiking boots are best for late fall and winter. When packing, keep in mind what kind of climate you will be living in at Lawrence Tech.

Climate

Southfield is located in a temperate zone that experiences four distinct seasons. Summers are warm (26 to 34°C) and winters can be cold (-7 to -1°C). Snow can begin in late October with measurable amounts from December to March. Spring and autumn are mild with more rainfall. In autumn, the leaves on the trees change color, which is a popular tourist attraction.

Fall Semester. The weather for late August and September is usually very warm, but the mornings and evenings can be cool (10 to 15°C). October and November are usually colder, with temperatures ranging from 2 to 5°C. December temperatures range from -5 to 3°C and precipitation in the form of ice and snow usually occurs. You will need a heavy coat, hat, and gloves.

Spring Semester. In January and February, average temperatures can range from -7°C to 3°C, with accumulations of snow and ice. You will need a warm, heavy jacket (heavy wool or insulated with down feathers, for example), winter boots, heavy gloves or mittens, and a hat and scarf. March and April are generally similar to October and November, while May and June are warm with rain. July and August are the warmest months in Michigan, with temperatures ranging from 18 to 38°C.

Should I Bring a Computer?

Feel free to bring a computer, but also be aware of Lawrence Tech's LTuZone. All undergraduate students are provided with a personal laptop or tablet computer pre-loaded with sophisticated software specially selected for each major. A deposit of US \$500 is required to receive a laptop, but this sum is refunded when you return the computer at the end of your studies. Graduate students enrolled in an undergraduate class qualify for the LTuZone program. All other graduate students can participate in the program for an additional fee.



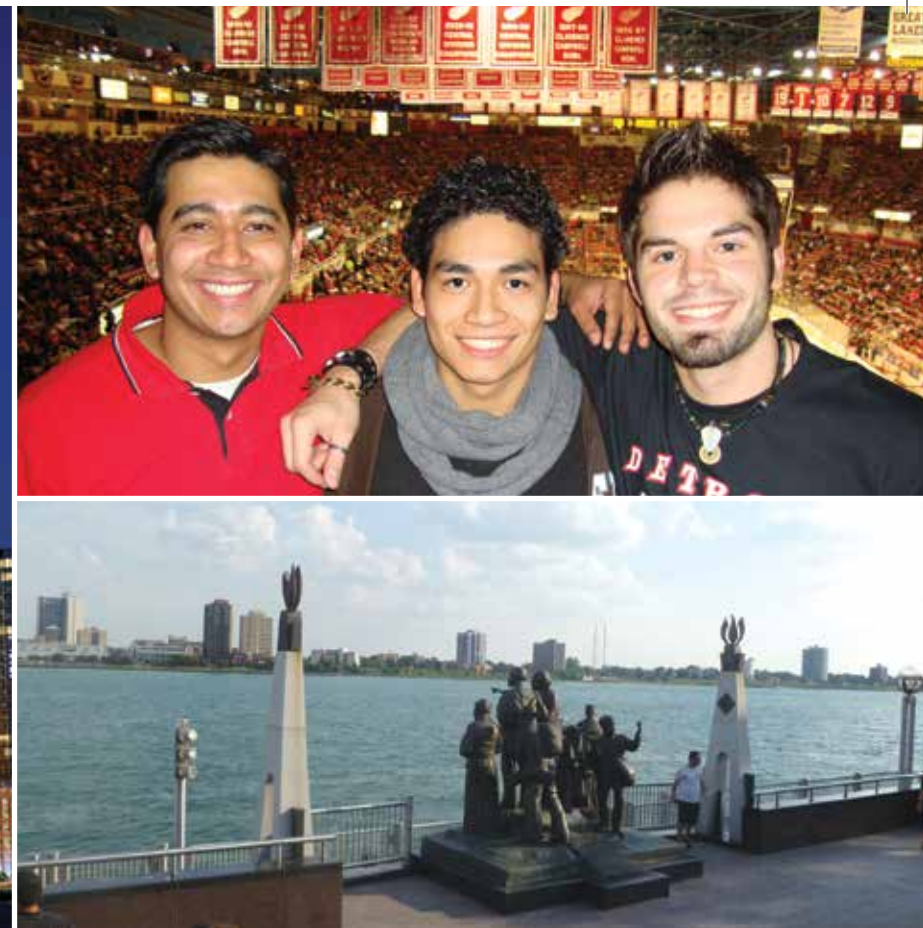
THE LTU CAMPUS

1. **A. Alfred Taubman Student Services Center.** The one-stop center for student services, the Taubman Center is home to the Offices of Admissions, Financial Aid, the Registrar, International Programs, University Housing, Career Services, Dean of Students, Student Government, the DTE Energy One-Stop Center/Enrollment Services, Academic Achievement Center, and the MPC Student Computing Center.
2. **Wayne H. Buell Management Building.** Contains the offices of the College of Management and most of the classrooms used by the College of Management. Also houses the Real Food on Campus (RFoC) dining area, Einstein Bros. Bagels coffee and sandwich kiosk, the bookstore, and the library. The Buell atrium is one of the largest gathering places on campus.
3. **Science Building.** Contains the offices, classrooms, and laboratories of the College of Arts and Sciences and the Mary E. Marburger Science and Engineering Auditorium (S100).

4. **A. Alfred Taubman Complex, Home of the Marburger STEM Center.** Houses biomedical and robotics engineering laboratories, studios, and offices; electrical engineering and computer science laboratories; and molecular and cell biology labs.
5. **Athletic Fields.** Soccer, lacrosse, flag football, and other outdoor field sports are played in this area.
6. **Engineering Building.** Contains the offices, classrooms, and laboratories of the College of Engineering. The Structural Testing Center is used for large-scale testing of advanced research projects. The student lounge is a cozy area for studying.
7. **Center for Innovative Materials Research.** One of the most unique facilities in the world, CIMR is used by the Department of Civil and Architectural Engineering for structural testing on a massive scale. This lab features a fire-testing oven and environmental chamber.
8. **University Housing–South.** Located across Ten Mile Road, this nine-story residence hall accommodates more than 300 students.

9. **University Technology and Learning Center.** Contains advanced architecture studios and some digital electronics and computer engineering labs. The Architecture Computer Resource Center is located at the main entrance, as is the Provisions on Demand (P.O.D.) express, which offers grab-and-go salads, sandwiches, snacks, and beverages. The UTLC Gallery is nearby.
10. **Architecture Building.** Houses the offices, classrooms, and studios of the College of Architecture and Design. The auditorium (A200) hosts lectures and presentations.
11. **Edward Donley Residence Hall** (formerly University Housing–North). This residence hall near the center of campus offers convenient housing for over 200 students on four floors.
12. **Lloyd E. Reuss Residence Hall.** This freshman residence houses 150 students.
13. **Don Ridler Field House/Applied Research Center.** The Ridler Field House athletic facility houses a fully equipped weight training room, racquetball courts, basketball courts, indoor running track, table tennis,

- billiards, locker rooms, and saunas. The Applied Research Center houses the Johnson Controls Vehicle Engineering Systems Laboratory and a 4 x 4 chassis dynamometer, a clay modeling studio, and engineering labs. It is also home to the Formula, Formula Hybrid, Baja, Supermileage, Aero Design, and Concrete Canoe teams.
14. **Art and Design Center.** Houses classrooms and studios used by the College of Architecture and Design's graphic and transportation design programs. Campus Safety is also located in this building.
15. **General Services Building.** Houses the offices of the University Architect, the athletics coaches, and the mailroom.
16. **Business Services Building.** Houses the Department of Finance and Administration, the Department of Campus Facilities, and LTU Online and eLearning Services.

PLACES TO GO AND THINGS TO DO

Lawrence Tech is located in the suburban city of Southfield in Oakland County, Michigan. One of the nation's most dynamic business and technology centers, Oakland County is among the wealthiest counties in the United States. Many of America's *Fortune 500* companies have business operations in the county, as well as hundreds of international companies. Oakland County also boasts over 1,400 natural inland lakes, 89,000 acres of parkland, and three downhill skiing facilities.

In addition, LTU students can enjoy the entertainment and cultural venues of the larger Metro Detroit area.

Sports

Known for its fascination with sports, the Detroit Metro area has it all.

- The **Pistons** basketball team plays at the Palace in Auburn Hills and the **Tigers** (baseball) and **Lions** (American football) play at Comerica Park and Ford Field, located next to each other in downtown Detroit. Minor league games are also held at these arenas.
- As close neighbors of Canada, Detroiters have always been ice hockey fans. Detroit is not only Motown, it is also Hockeytown. The **Red Wings** also play in downtown Detroit.

Museums and Cultural Institutions

The Metro area offers a wide range of museums and cultural and historical attractions.

- The **Detroit Institute of Arts**, in Detroit's cultural center, has been extensively renovated and showcases many famous works of art. It also has a film theater.
- The **Museum of Contemporary Art Detroit** presents art at the forefront of contemporary culture.
- The **Charles H. Wright Museum of African American History**, in Detroit's cultural center, chronicles the history of African Americans in the United States and hosts regular traveling exhibits.
- The **Michigan Science Center**, in Detroit's cultural center, features an enticing array of hands-on exhibits and displays, a planetarium, and an IMAX theater.
- Located in Royal Oak, about five miles from campus, the **Detroit Zoo** is a great weekend excursion. The animals are housed in realistic park-like settings along beautifully landscaped paths.
- The **Motown Historical Museum**, "Hitsville USA," in Detroit, is the home of the famous Motown sound and Motown Records. Smokey Robinson, Stevie Wonder, Marvin Gaye, the Supremes, the Temptations, the Four Tops, and the Jackson Five all got their start here.
- The **Henry Ford Museum** and **Greenfield Village**, in Dearborn, highlight American history and culture and feature a huge outdoor working village and an IMAX theater.

- The **Arab American National Museum**, also in Dearborn, is devoted to Arab-American history and culture and features a permanent collection of artifacts, documents, and photographs.
- The **Holocaust Memorial Center** in Farmington Hills chronicles the history of the Jews in Europe, the rise of Nazi Germany, and the Holocaust.
- **Cranbrook** in Bloomfield Hills is an educational community built around the oldest surviving manor home in Metro Detroit. The **Cranbrook Art Museum** focuses on contemporary art; the **Cranbrook Institute of Science** specializes in natural history and features a planetarium; and the manor home, open for tours, is surrounded by acres of groomed gardens.

Music, Concerts, Theater

Too numerous to list, the Metro area offers an incredible variety of music, entertainment, and theater ranging from traveling international acts to small community productions.

Automobiles

As the capital of the auto industry in the United States, Detroit is called the Motor City. Although the auto industry is undergoing great change, the area remains a treasure trove of automotive history and culture.

- The **North American International Auto Show**, one of the largest auto shows in the world, is held annually in downtown Detroit.
- **Automotive Hall of Fame**, in Dearborn, chronicles the history of the international auto industry.

- The **Ford Rouge Factory** tour encompasses the entire vehicle production process, starting with raw ore and finishing with cars ready for sale.
- Tour the homes of past auto magnates, such as the **Edsel and Eleanor Ford House** and **Meadow Brook Hall**.
- The **Woodward Dream Cruise** in August features tens of thousands of classic cars and celebrates the Golden Age of automobiles.

Fabulous Food

The Metro area also has many specialty food markets. If you are craving the taste of home, stop by one of them to buy something familiar. Visit the ethnic centers around the area and try a restaurant for an American take on one of your favorites.

- **Mexicantown**, located next to the Ambassador Bridge to Canada, offers authentic Mexican culture and food. Feel free to speak either English or Spanish.
- **Greektown** offers a dynamic cultural experience in downtown Detroit.
- **Dearborn**, home to the largest population of Arab Americans in the United States, features many Middle Eastern restaurants, bakeries, grocery stores, and mosques.
- **Hamtramck**, home to Polish immigrants for many years, features some of the best Polish restaurants in the area and a changing multicultural vibe.

THE UNITED STATES

While studying in the United States, take the opportunity to explore and experience as much as you can during your stay. Although you are expected to remain at Lawrence Tech while your classes are in session, your visa allows you to freely travel throughout the country during scheduled holiday breaks.

If you choose to travel by car, get a map and mark your routes. Michigan, the Great Lakes State, is a good place to start. Surrounded by the largest source of fresh water in the world, Michigan has beautiful beaches, rivers, streams, and forests. Western Michigan is especially well known for its sandy beaches. Check out Grand Haven for the U.S. Coast Guard Festival, Holland for the Tulip Festival, or Traverse City for the National Cherry Festival. Mackinac Island is a particularly beautiful step back in time with its old British fort, Victorian homes, and ban on all motorized vehicles.

Chicago, the third largest city in the United States, is only about a five-hour drive from campus. Here you can see the Sears Tower, the tallest building in the United States. Visit the many museums, and shop along Michigan Avenue's "Magnificent Mile." Take some time to enjoy the entertainment venues along Navy Pier.

Many other areas are easily accessible via air travel leaving Detroit Metropolitan Airport, which is a hub for Delta Airlines. Metro Airport also provides service to most major U.S. cities from a variety of airlines.

CANADA

The United States' northern border with Canada is the longest common border in the world. Travel and trade between the two countries is peaceful and plentiful, but you need the proper documentation to enter Canada. You must have a resident visitor visa and you will be required to clear immigration and customs, just as you did when you entered the United States. Carry all of your documents while traveling. More information about obtaining a resident visitor visa can be found at www.cic.gc.ca/english/information/applications/visa.asp.

A geographical quirk of southeastern Michigan is that people who wish to visit Canada must initially travel south. There are two nearby ways to cross the border by car: the Ambassador Bridge and the Windsor Tunnel, both of which take you directly into downtown Windsor, Ontario. Windsor is a great city to explore with its beautiful riverfront park, diverse restaurants, shopping, galleries, and museums.

Toronto, Ontario, the largest city in Canada, is easily accessible by car or train. In only about four and a half hours, you can be in this huge international city that is the center of Canada's economic engine. Toronto's cultural diversity rivals many of the great cities of the world. Be sure to visit its museums or see a play, a concert, or a great game of hockey.

Only a short drive from Toronto is Niagara Falls. These massive waterfalls on the Niagara River straddle the U.S./Canadian border between Ontario and the state of New York. The largest portion of the falls is on the Canadian side, and they are best viewed there. This natural wonder is awe inspiring any time of the year.
